

Databases for General Research

Useful for All Subject Areas

To access these databases 24/7, log on to either *myNWACC Connection* (click on <u>Library</u>) or *Blackboard* (from the Student Resources tab, click on <u>NWACC Library</u>). Once on the Library page, click on <u>Research Databases</u>.

- 1. <u>Credo Reference</u> Start here. Useful for *picking a topic, identifying search terms,* and getting a general *topic overview*. Full-text articles from 800+ reference books.
- <u>Gale Virtual Reference Library</u> Another solid choice for *gathering background* and *finding general sources*. A collection of 12,000+ reference books and specialized, subject-specific encyclopedias in every discipline.
- 3. <u>Academic Search Premier</u> Useful for *journal articles* and *eBooks*. Has more than 4,600 journals, including nearly 3,900 peer-reviewed titles. This scholarly collection offers information in nearly every area of academic study.
- 4. <u>ProQuest Central</u> Search for scholarly journals, trade publications, magazines, books, newspapers, reports, and videos.
- 5. <u>Access World News</u> Useful for *world, regional, and local news*. Includes full-text of newspapers, broadcast media transcripts, and editorials/opinion sections.
- 6. <u>Opposing Viewpoints</u> Useful for *controversial topics, current events,* and *informative, proposal,* and *argumentative/persuasive papers.* Gives both sides of the story. Provides pro/con viewpoints, as well as results from academic journals, news sources, magazines, and reference books. Includes statistics, audio, videos, images and website links.
- 7. Films on Demand Useful for *credible video*. Provides thousands of educational and academic programs and documentaries. All films are broken into smaller segments to provide relevant snippets of information. Use the Transcript tab while viewing to copy/paste the narration text for citation. If the film does not offer a transcript, view with Closed Captions to capture text for citation.
